Curricular Aspects

Shikshan Mandal Bhagur's Shri Eknathrao Shete Arts, Science and Commerce College, Deolali Camp Nashik is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune, and follows the CBCS curriculum from 2019 approved by the university and Now New Education Policy 2020. The vision and mission statements of the institute have been precisely established and are aligned with the current educational strategy. Teachers take part in seminars on syllabus reorganization, workshops, and special guidance on ICT-based teaching technology in order to improve their teaching methods. The academic calendar is prepared and closely adhered to at the start of the academic year. Each department creates a timetable and academic calendar that contains gaps for mandatory tasks, optional assignments, soft skills training, seminars, workshops, trips, and study tours, among other things.

1.2. Academic Flexibility:

The College offers Arts, Commerce & Science all 03 Under Graduate programmes. The college offered short term courses focusing on the employability and skill development of the students in the last academic year. Academic flexibility is provided through elective CBCS courses in all programmes.

1.3. Curriculum enrichment:

The student-centric mechanism is developed and utilized to promote collaborative, practical, and participatory learning through tasks, internships, company visits, surveys, educational trips, demonstrations and ongoing evaluations through seminars, workshops, group discussions, class tests, homework assignments, tutorials and practicals. Courses on topics including professional ethics, gender equality, human values, the environment and sustainable development are included in the curriculum for UG programmes.

1. 4. Feedback system

The college has gathered feedback from stakeholders, including parents, professors, alumni, and students, both online and offline. Feedback is gathered on the curriculum, teaching and learning, support services, and infrastructure facilities in order to evaluate academic performance and learning experiences. The feedback reports that have been examined and actions taken are available on the college's official website. The college collects, analysis, and prepares a report on all stakeholder feedback and actions.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- Admission process is online through Vriddhi software, transparent, unbiased, and strictly follows the norms of eligibility criteria, statutory bodies, and reservation policy of government of Maharashtra and SPPU, Pune.
- Teacher-student ratio is well maintained and they adopt appropriate teaching pedagogies to address the experiential, participative, and problem-solving approaches using ICT integration to

enhance the learning experiences through various activities. For effective curriculum delivery, teachers use ICT tools like digital classroom, online platforms like Zoom and Google meet, YouTube videos and PPTs.

- Few tests enable the teachers to identify the advanced and slow learners. Subsequently advanced learners are encouraged to achieve some special goals and carriers and slow learners are given boost through remedial classes.
- Principal appoints College Examination Officer (CEO) and forms Examination Committee for smooth conduction of internal and external examinations.
- Various methods of assessment like seminars, viva-voce, projects, field visits, tutorials, assignments, group discussions etc. are used for internal assessment. Departments organize study tours, industrial visits, and industrial training programs to provide students with practical exposure and real world experiences.
- The institute follows a systematic planning process and adheres to the academic calendar.
- Examinations, curricular and co-curricular events, and teaching plans are scheduled and monitored through review meetings, teacher's diaries, and teaching plans.
- Barcode system is implemented by the University for hiding students' identity and to prevent malpractices during the assessment.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

The National Education Policy (NEP) has to be put into practice with an ambitious goal in order to provide excellent learning as well as promote and incorporate important, skill-based education across India for the growth of HEI as a whole. During the academic year 2023–2024, SESS College Deolali Camp Nashik organized a workshop and also a program for faculty development on national education policy (NEP). The function of the college itself is multidisciplinary. It was founded with the goal of enabling prosperity by delivering high-quality education in developing disciplines and creating skilled, educated human resources for the elevation of impoverished rural communities that contribute to the

growth of national development. The college adheres to the recommended curriculum of SPPU University. The university has covered subjects like democracy, the constitution, and cyber security. Languages are an elective subject for science students. Many undergraduate students must take at least one multidisciplinary course in order to graduate. Through its number of departments, the college encourages interdisciplinary learning among the students. The college offers several kinds of multidisciplinary credentials, add-on courses, and value-based courses. Our college offers multidisciplinary education and engages in research activities with the support of the Arts, Commerce, and Science streams to meet the present need and NEP criteria in order to accomplish these goals.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The college has made the effort to open Academic Bank of Credit accounts for each and every UG student. The Academic Bank of Credit will be opened and maintained through staff and student orientation programmes offered by the college. According to UGC and SPPU Pune rules, the choice-based credit system (CBCS) is fully implemented for all programmes commencing in the 2019–20 academic year. In accordance with the curriculum, the college already provides credit-based courses and activities. In order to complete programme requirements, it also organises community service and engagement events. Regarding credit transfers, the college abides by the university's policies. After completing the course and passing the examinations, students will receive credits. In accordance with the CBCS system, UG students must complete 132 compulsory credits from the syllabus along with to extra 08 credits from extracurricular activities, study tours, field trips, seminars, conferences, and AVISHKAR competitions. With the enactment of the New Education Policy, students can benefit from a smooth Academic Bank of Credit process for the courses provided at the college. A suitable technological support system will be developed for ABC monitoring.

3. Skill development:

A few skill development courses are offered by the college to increase employment prospects among pupils. The Skill Development Centre has been developed by the college. Certificate programmes are currently offered by the college. According to NEP,

in order to add to and enhance students' co-curricular learning, our faculties have created three short-term certificate programmes, taking into consideration the skills that pupils will need to learn in their degree programmes as well as the demands of the local community. These certificate programmes have been approved by the IQAC of the college and then forwarded to the affiliated university's for final approval. More certificate programmes that collaborate with companies and industries will be added to the college in the coming days in order to effectively implement the New Education Policy. Through experiential learning, practical skills are ingrained throughout laboratory sessions. Project work, internships, and skill development programmes are provided by the college. The Innovation and Startup Centre was developed by the college to foster entrepreneurship development via courses for fostering concepts. The Career Guidance and Placement Cell provide courses to help individuals develop the skills needed for a variety of organisations and industries, as well as to prepare them for a range of competitive exams and employment opportunities. Industry professionals are invited to provide orientation training and guidance sessions, which improve placements and help employees internalize the skills. The National Service Scheme teaches pupils life skills and social awareness in a rational way. One of the institution's best practices is to mentor students, giving them the opportunity to explore career options and personal growth in the direction of establishing a nation.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

Our college has provided facilities to the community through a variety of arts, commerce, and science programmes, since 2019. The institute adheres to the curriculum set forth by the affiliated university. In addition to traditional core disciplines, university curricula include required courses like Modern Indian languages (MIL) and allow students the opportunity to earn extra credits through Skill Enhancement Courses. The language of instruction for the faculties of commerce and arts is Marathi. Both English and Marathi are accessible for the faculty of commerce. Our rural pupils speak Marathi as their mother tongue, and we communicate with them in Marathi. The college is spearheading the Marathi capabilities, enhancement, and effort exercises in collaboration

with stakeholders. The important skills to give pupils a sense of individuality, acceptance, and respect are social mindfulness and articulations in the mother tongue. As part of Indian culture, students also celebrate a variety of festivals. On campus, there are additional camps for yoga and meditation.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

A student-centered teaching and learning model termed "outcome-based education" (OBE) uses a course curriculum that is designed to help students attain specified objectives and outcomes. The evaluation of pupil performance, or outcomes at multiple levels, is the main focus of OBE. At the end of courses and programmes, these outcomes are estimated and mapped in terms of attainment levels. HEI uses the university's CBCS curriculum for a number of programmes that are based on documents from the UGC-LOCF. In addition, the institute offers certificate programmes based on skills, the curriculum of which will be transformed in accordance with OBE. The school intends to provide Outcome Based Education orientation to both staff and students. To make teaching and learning more student-centric, faculty members across different streams employ a variety of pedagogical strategies, including ICT use, field trips, projects, internships, and so on. The institute has the necessary infrastructure available to maximize learning results. MoUs for student placement with different industries. Interview and training have been completed by the organization with a number of other organizations and industries.

EVM and VVPAT machines are used in elections; EC authorities organized an awareness workshop to inform students and the community about this fact. Students and teachers of college run campaign on voter registration. Campaigns promoting voter awareness were held around Bhagur as well as Devalali camp. Bhagur Nagar Parishad and Devalali Camp Cantonment welcomes all of the efforts being made to raise awareness about elections, voter rights, and duties. The main objectives of ELC is to promote awareness of 'Right to vote' among students, faculty members and community at large. To enable critical thinking on issues related to election rights, democracies and its processes.

Principal Mr. Mrityunjay Kapse and the ELC members, encouraging the youth to engage in the election process with democratic principles and safety. , Collocation competition, expert discussions on constitutional values are organized. A voter registration campaign for students is carried out at a college.

- Experiential Learning: The teachers use the following experiential learning techniques to give the students hands on experience apart from regular classroom lectures. Many competition and group discussions are conducted by all departments. Students are encouraged to participate in various inter-collegiate competitions, department of Hindi conducts various activities (Hindi week) such as Essay competitions, poster making online video, poster making. Department of English & B.Sc. are also use video base learning.
- Project based Learning: For certain subjects in the undergraduate curriculum need projects. Students are abetted in determining and choosing the project's problem. By the guidance of university, the student drafts project reports, which is checked by supervisor then approves. At the time of COVID-19 epidemic, virtual classrooms and platforms such as Google Meet, Zoom Meet and YouTube were used for teaching and learning. The college was limited as a result of the national and state wise shut down.
- Applicable exercises are tailored to meet the needs of individual learners. Students who come from the remote interior regions of a Sahyadri Hills, are found slow learners, usually have not that much confidence to deal withlanguageissues. Though they are good in their regional language, they have not adequate knowledge of English language. In order to improve the slow learner students' learning experiences, we offer remedial classes and bridge courses for slow learner students.

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

HEI strictly follows the guidelines given by the affiliated S. P. Pune University. The Principal appoints the College Examination Officer (CEO) and forms the Examination Committee for the smooth conduct of internal and external examinations. The principal and CEO also inform the students about the rules and regulations of the credit system in the induction program. Our teachers described the evaluation process of internal and external evaluations to the students at the very beginning of each semester. Internal exam calendars are created and communicated to the students in advance. Internal exam complaints are resolved timely. Marks lists of subjects are published on notice board for students information. The rules for entering and exiting the examination room are strictly observed, so there is nothing to complain about in this area. The grades of the final events examinations are uploaded to the university portal. The occupant list is prepared in advance in accordance with Common Criteria, The process of grievance redressal system is fully transparent. If any complaint is raised, action will be taken on emergency level. Regular class tests will be held in all subjects in the month of November. The students who have not cleared first year are not allowed to appear in final year examination. Students must secure minimum 40% marks in their class internal tests, and also in the university examination. The minimum marks to be scored in batchers degree examination is 40% for B.A., B.Com. & B.Sc. students. All course have to attained compulsory 132 credits and 8 credits are depend on grade subjects for example value added course, physical education, democracy etc.

Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website

Response:

Program outcomes and Course outcomes identify the unique knowledge and skills that can be learned in a particular course and program. POs and COs relate to the skills, knowledge and behaviours that students acquire. Program-specific outcomes are what students in a particular program should be able to do while studying in the program. Program results and are achieved through the achievement of course results. Curriculum includes the description of course outcomes and the assignment of POs and COs. These department-level committees set goals for the CO and PO prior to the start of the semester, taking

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into account past performance in the streak and current pass rate. Course coordinators have been given free rein to design the CO and map the COs from the PO, and assessment tools and rubrics will be determined by the course coordinator with the approval of the faculty board. The implementation of the PO includes direct and indirect evaluations. The direct rating was weighted at 70% and the indirect at 30%. The direct PO score is defined as the cumulative CO score. The mid-term evaluation includes test in a structured manner, oral examination, paper presentation, home assignment or combination of them as per choice of respective subject teacher. Institution takes feedback from faculty, students, alumni on achievement of CO, PO of curriculum. In general, the CO-PO mapping is performed by subject teacher. Departmental Head & members discuss the CO-PO and ensure adherence, implementation and achievement thereof before the start of the course. CO performance is measured based on the results of the cumulative internal exams and the university-administered end-of-semester exam. It is a form of direct measurement of success. The overall grade of a certain subject results from a weighting of 30% of the internal assessment instruments and a weighting of 70% of the final exam at the end of the semester.

The outcomes are used as a benchmark for evaluating the quality of education that colleges provide. The Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of the curriculum and course objectives have been designed by the college with input from the affiliated university, requests and suggestions from the College Development Committee, teacher views, and regional demands. The college places a great emphasis on the students' learning, the development of their analytical skills, the department's awareness of the major fields within the subject, the communication abilities of pupils, management skills, approach to problem-solving, collaboration, and leadership abilities through the POs and COs. For identifying areas where the desired Learning Outcomes are not being met and to provide ways for enhancement, the college has implemented the following approaches: The purpose of departmental and staff meetings are to assess how well learning objectives are being meet. The results of internal assessments and examinations are examined subject-by-subject, and mark lists displaying students' overall achievement are developed. To achieve Course Outcomes (COs) and Programme Outcomes (POs) for each assessment year, the Higher Education Institution (HEI) utilizes final-year result-based evaluations and program exit analyses. The COs for all courses are calculated using final-year results, with the students' internal and external examination performance determining the successful completion of COs. A 50% cutoff requirement is established for awarding COs across all courses. The relevant departments analyze the overall

performance of COs and POs, supported by comprehensive teacher-prepared course files that include the syllabus, CO-PO mapping, teaching plans, attendance records, internal assessment results, assignments, seminar and presentation reports, certificates of course completion, and attainment levels. University exam performance is the primary metric for assessing CO achievement, while curriculum feedback from stakeholders and students serves as a heuristic to indirectly evaluate outcomes. To assess students' abilities and interpersonal skills, departments organize events such as poster and model preparation. Indirect methods of assessing COs and POs also consider students' placements, progression to higher education, and participation in various activities.

To identify areas where desired Learning Outcomes (LOs) are not met and to implement improvements, the college adopts several strategies. Departmental and staff meetings are convened to assess the achievement of LOs. Internal assessments and examination results are analyzed subject-by-subject, with mark lists developed to display overall student performance. Data analysis helps identify students' strengths and weaknesses, enabling targeted counseling for improvement. Findings from these assessments guide efforts to enhance student-focused learning approaches. For students struggling in specific topics, remedial classes are implemented by the concerned teacher. Departments also enhance practical learning through field visits and industrial tours. Additionally, student employment and overall development are considered essential metrics for evaluating program results.

Awareness about Sanitary Napkin among Tribal adolescent girls & uneducated working women

Introduction:

As part of Shikshan mandal Bhagur Shree Ekanathrao Sahadu SheteArts Commerce & Science College Best practice, we organized an awareness program on sanitary napkins for Tribal adolescent girls and uneducated working women College Students. The program aimed to educate and empower these women on menstrual hygiene, health, and sanitation.

Objectives of the Practice:

- · To create awareness about usage of sanitary napkins among adolescent girls in the rural, tribal and hilly areasaround the college
- \cdot To provide guidance of Sanitary Napkin to the students coming from rural, tribal and hilly area background
- · To create awareness among the students for various negative issues regarding uses of sanitary napkins
- · To visit various Vasti's nearby Bhagur & Igatpuri village to create awareness among the women and girlsregarding uses of sanitary napkins
- · To conduct workshops for awareness of health and diet and uses of sanitary napkins
- · To encourage freedom of expressing themselves appropriately
- · To develop their critical thinking and decision making in case of emergencies and natural disasters

The Practise:

The program was conducted in a rural area, where a large number of sugarcane laborers reside. We identified local adolescent girls and sugarcane labor women as the target beneficiaries. A team of experts, including a gynecologist, a nurse, and a social worker, was invited to deliver lectures and demonstrations on sanitary napkins.

Program Highlights:

- 1. **Lecture and Demonstration:** The gynecologist delivered a lecture on menstrual hygiene, emphasizing the importance of using sanitary napkins. The nurse demonstrated the proper use of sanitary napkins, and the social worker discussed the social and cultural aspects of menstruation.
- 2. **Interactive Session:** The participants engaged in an interactive session, where they shared their experiences, concerns, and questions related to menstrual health. The experts addressed their queries and provided guidance on overcoming the challenges faced during menstruation.
- 3. **FreeDistribution of Sanitary Napkins:** Sanitary napkins were distributed free of cost to all the participants, along with a user manual and a contact number for further queries.

Evidence of Success:

The program was well-received by the participants, who expressed their gratitude for the initiative. The program achieved its objectives, as evident from the feedback received:

- 1. Increased Awareness: The participants demonstrated a significant increase in awareness about menstrual hygiene and the importance of using sanitary napkins.
- 2. Improved Knowledge: The participants showed improved knowledge about proper menstrual hygiene practices, including the use of sanitary napkins, handwashing, and disposal of used napkins.
- 3. Empowerment: The participants felt empowered to take control of their menstrual health, and many expressed their intention to adopt healthy menstrual practices.

The awareness program on sanitary napkins for adolescent girls and sugarcane labor women was a successful initiative that achieved its objectives.
